In the past year, we received many new names and photographs to add to our Veteran's Memorial Room. We have filled the shelves on two walls

and are ready to purchase more shelving for a third wall. That being said, we are still accepting names, service reports and photographs of any man or woman who was born in, lived in, or is buried in Westville, who served in the military, during war or peace time. Photographs need to be 5x7. If that size isn't available, we can scan and return the original photo.

In addition to our continuing efforts to add to our veteran's room, we have also started a new venture. The land behind the museum leads down a hill to the Salmon River. For several years we have tossed around the idea of cleaning it up (dead trees, etc.) and making the lot usable for picnics and summer events. Along came our neighbor, Reed St. Ann, who has a tractor with attachments, and he took care of all that overgrown mess. He has completely cleared the land.

WHY DO WE SEEK OUT OUR ANCESTRY? WE ARE THE CHOSEN...

In each family there is one who seems called to find the ancestors. To put flesh on their bones and make them live again, to tell the family story and to feel that somehow they know and approve.

Doing genealogy is not a cold gathering of facts, but, instead, breathing life into all who have gone before. We are the storytellers of the tribe. All tribes have one. We have been called, as it were, by our genes. Those who have gone before cry out to us, "Tell our story!" So, we do.

In finding them, we somehow find ourselves. How many graves have I stood before and cried? I have lost count. How many times have I told the ancestors, "You have a wonderful family; you would be proud of us." How many times have I walked up to a grave and felt somehow there was love there for me? I cannot say.

It goes beyond just documenting facts. It goes to who I am and why I do the things I do. It goes to seeing a cemetery about to be lost forever to weeds and indifference and saying "I can't let this happen." The bones here are bones and flesh of my flesh. It goes to doing something about it. It goes to pride in what our ancestors were able to accomplish, how they contributed to what we are today. It goes to respecting their hardships and losses, their never giving in or giving up, their resoluteness to go on and build a life for their family.

It goes to deep pride that the fathers fought and some died to make and keep us a nation. It goes to a deep and immense understanding that they were doing it for us. It is of equal pride and love that our mothers struggled to give us birth. Without them we would not exist, and so we love each one, as far back as we can reach.

That we might be born who we are. That we might remember them. So we do. With love and caring and scribing each fact of their existence, because we are they and they are the sum of who we are. It is up to that one called in the next generation to answer the call and take my place in the long line of family storytellers.

That is why I do my family genealogy, what calls those young and old to step up and restore the memory or greet those whom we had never known before.
